
QURBAN

Qurban is MAA's primary humanitarian Food Aid programme. Traditionally, livestock is sacrificed at the point of distribution and fresh meat is given to the beneficiaries immediately. However, MAA also packs Qurban meat in sustainable, long-shelf-life packages that can be distributed where electricity and refrigeration are absent.

Our focus is to deliver Qurban Food Aid to the most vulnerable people, including widows, orphans, the elderly, internally displaced people, refugees and the poor.




RAMADAN


MAA's Orphan Aid programme is designed to address the basic needs of orphans and improve their lives in a way that respects the customs and traditions of the countries in which they reside.

MAA believes that everyone should have access to clean water. This underpins all other aspects of development. Unfortunately, more than a billion people lack access to safe drinking water today.





MAA is a full member of the Australian Council for International Development (ACFID) and therefore, a signatory of the ACFID Code of Conduct. As a result, we are committed to adhering towards a high standard of accountability and transparency. We are also committed to the ACFID Fundraising Charter. Respect, protection of human rights, sustainability and fair, continuous improvement form the foundations of MAA's work. Risk management involves thinking about, understanding, regularly monitoring risks, and taking mitigation actions when necessary.




